



Therapeutic Riding: Therapeutic riding is conducted by a certified riding instructor in either a 30 minute semi-private (1-2 participants) or an hour lesson of 2 or more participants similar in either age or ability that focuses on increasing individual equine skills while gaining a variety of therapeutic benefits. Benefits include such things as increasing muscle tone and strength, regaining the use of muscles, improving hand/eye coordination and balance, improving peer interactions and communication, increasing self-esteem and developing a sense of empowerment.

Hippotherapy: Hippotherapy practices an intensive one-on-one therapy model, where a licensed medical professional works in conjunction with the movement of the horse as a catalyst and incentive for participants to reach therapeutic goals. We are currently working with Children's Village, and one of their Speech Language Pathologists.

Carriage Driving: Our driving program allows us to serve a wider population of adults and children with disabilities who may not be ready or able to yet participate in horseback riding. This is a great option for someone who has limited mobility, exceeds our riding weight limit, or needs to build up their strength before riding. It is a fun and exciting sport!

Honored Elders: The Pegasus Project has partnered with several senior care centers around Yakima to provide a memory care based experience for their residents. The Honored Elders program includes hands on experience in tack care, horse nutrition, and grooming. In addition to the hands on experience, this program features a classroom component to help residents reinforce concepts learned.


Life Skills: The life skills program works with the special education departments at local high schools to add specialized equine curriculum and unique learning experiences to students educational programming. In this program students learn how to care for an equine facility, caring for tack, anatomy of the horse, grooming and riding skills.

Experience Pegasus Days: By partnering with organizations in the Yakima Valley, the Pegasus Project has the opportunity to perform community outreach throughout the year and invite participants from other service organizations around the valley to experience the therapeutic benefits of equines through a "day on the farm!"






PARTICIPANTS



Scholarship: In 2016, Pegasus Project awarded \$18,975 in scholarships. 24 full scholarships and 2 partial scholarships were awarded. 59% percent of our riders are on scholarship to offset the costs of tuition.

Volunteers: During the 2016 fiscal year, the Pegasus Project had 96 active volunteers. These dedicated volunteers donated 2,827 hours of service!
